OG TRIP TO BAJA

I love Mexico!!



Our lives are so calculated and demanding here in the states and yet, when we cross the border, our shoulders drop and all the rigidity just seems to disappear.

Lyle Davis, Steve Parkford and I flew out of Tijuana en route to Loreto. The flight was uneventful and all our gear made it. So far so good. We proceeded to load the Suburban and head to a beach front palapa for some tacos and ice cold Mexican Coca Cola. No sooner did we sip our Cokes and our driver said "we have to leave now, highway is

closed with a semi truck wreck and fatality". Plan now was to drive to the accident, unload our gear and walk it past the accident to another vehicle waiting on the other

side. Welcome to Mexico!

Our destination was Mag Bay and eventually we arrived unscathed. The recent fish reports had been dismal. "Wahoo really haven't showed up this year" the captain says, but Steve had researched the topography and we were willing to try some new "unnamed" spots.

Next morning we load the boat and head out a couple 3 hours. We stopped and looked at a couple of spots but yet to jump in. 3rd stop





we're gonna get wet. Water is 73 and purplish blue. Steve jumps in 1st, then Lyle and I follow. Steve surfaces and yells WAHOOO! what, 1st dive?! Lyle's loading his gun as I proceed to throw my flasher. This fish couldn't resist and headed my



direction. BOOM, fish on. 1st wahoo was on the boat within 20 minutes of arrival. There was a school of about 20 fish that would glide in about every 40 minutes or so. The key was patience. We all missed some and landed some but at the end of the day our tally was 7 fish. SO STOKED!!

The plan for day 2 was the same as day 1 with one exception, we wanted an 8 fish total today. What was left of that 1st school was very wary. We had knocked it down from about 20 fish to maybe 12. They just wouldn't come within range. Then around noon a new large school showed up, unaware of what was about to happen. BOOM, BOOM, BOOM! A triple hook up. Floats ripping in all directions! By the time we all had secured our fish the captain came by and said Lyle and Steve were over there and in them thick, do I want to get on the boat? Not a chance, I had wahoo all around me with tunas now in the mix. At one point I had a mix of tunas from 10 to 80lbs, from 5' to 60' deep, cruising by for a solid 30 seconds. What a sight!

At this point Steve decides he wants to see what's on the bottom. Yellowtail, hauchinango and grouper were on the menu. On the flight out Steve was reminding us that he's no longer a deep diver.....yet he pulls the trigger on a 45lb grouper at 87'. This was going to be our dinner tonight, so good.



Final count was 19 Wahoo, 1 Grouper and 1 Dorado. The magic of Mag Bay never
















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
