As many of you already know, the 2018 Abalone season has been closed. The California Fish and Game Commission voted unaminously to close the season due to concerns about declining abalone populations. They cited evidence of mass starvation and mortality among red abalone over the past several years. A decline in Kelp growth, combined with a rise in purple sea urchins has been blamed for the decline. For more information click here

White Seabass:





Blood Sweat and Tears Lou Rosales

I have had a soft spot in my deck for some time now and had been planning to deal with it this winter during my Christmas break. Fortunately, my buddy Scott offered to help me out. He took two weeks off and we planned to work on the boat for about a week and hopefully get some diving time as well.

That was the plan!

The day after Christmas, we tore into the deck. It was something I had been looking forward to and dreading at the same time. I was looking forward to fixing the issue but was scared of what I might find. I was hoping that it was just delaminated fiberglass and it would be a simple fix. I was fearing that it would be wet and turn into a much larger job.

The first step was to cut into the deck...it was wet but the wet area wasn't too large and the wood seemed to be in pretty good shape. A good sign right? We thought so, but then I stepped into the storage compartment and found another soft spot. Sure enough it was wet also and I drilled a hole through the wood and found standing water! Not good.

We cut out a section and found chunks of styrofoam floating in the water.



To make a long story shorter, we also found a soft spot in the fore hold and demo'd that. The demo took two days and we threw away a lot of rotten wood!












After the demo is complete it is time to plan the repairs. We decided that the new holds would not have a floor and the fore hold would be divided into two. We cut out the aft hole quite a bit shorter than the hold because there would be weights and other items that we want in that location and wanted to be able to raise the hatch without moving the weight box. All the hatches are the same width and that was determined by the seat box dimensions since one of the hatches will be almost completely under the seat.

Time to execute and test fit! We spent one day planning the layout, cutting wood and making sure everything fit.





















After test fitting, it was time to execute the plan. We decided to do our version of Radon style hatches which should keep the water out of the compartments. The access hatches would be much larger than the previous hatches and combined with the deeper compartment, they should be much more useful.

I still have to glass the deck and all the hatch covers, then install into the boat and class all of the seams.

All the blood sweat and tears will eventually pay off and Olivia will be back in the water. I am very fortunate to have Scott as a buddy...he has as much blood sweat and tears invested into Olivia as I do and he has always been there to give me that extra hand or piece of advice.





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
