
#### March 2015 President's Message

## Neptunes History

Thanks to past Newsletter Editor Phil Polanco for another article that he featured in the

Trident over a decade ago.

the Trailblazers

This section is dedicated to the pioneers of our sport. The brave who paved the way for the diving community. The *parents* who led us by hand to expose another world. A place that does not exist to those who do not leave the surface.

Dick Bonin's introduction to diving came in the Navy. At the out break of the Korean War, he enlisted and was sent to Officer candidate school in Rhode Island. The commanding officer, watching him perform in a intra-squad swimm meet suggested that he volunteer for underwater demolition training. A native to Chicago, Bonin had never seen the ocean prior to that. Only 19 out 137 candidates made it through the grueling course. Dick spent the next three years as a *frogman*, the forerunners to todays SEAL teams.

"I liked diving right from the begining...and was always entranced with it"
In 1954, Dick he was involved in a search for the Civil War ironclad, Monitor. A man had claimed to have found the wreck site and obtained a contract with LIFE Magazine. There were not many divers at that time so, LIFE contacted the Navy. "We were pretty close after diving on everything we could find. We didn't have the electronics that are available today, it wasn't for another 30 years that they found the Monitor.

Bonin's most exciting experience occured on a deep-water test in 1955. "I may hold the record for free ascent, the Navy was using three open-circuit units: the Aqualung, the Scott and the Northill. Washington decided that we should have deep-water tests on them. We went down to a submarine anchorage off North Carolina to conduct deep dives to 250 feet with all the units. Lines and decompression stages were set up. The Chief took the Scott and I took the Northill...I was down at the bottom of the line, about 250', when it started leaking water. We found out afterward that the exhaust valve (which was in the middle of the diaphragm) inverted and popped out leaving a hole for water to pour in. I cleared it out, cleared it out to the point where I could not clear it any more, so I made a free ascent up the line. There were masks hanging down at the decompression stages. I made it to the stage. While decompressing around sixteen Hammerheads came in and circled the stage. Later to find out, the rescue vessel had thrown garbage over the fantail. That was exciting, I have not heard of anyone making a free ascent from a greater depth."

Discharged in 1956 from the Navy, he began a career working for the still new dive industry. Back in Chicago diving in the Lakes, "We dove in Lake Michagan recovering weapons and deceased people when the Police asked for volunteers. The Sheriffs recovery teams evolved from that.

Two years later Bonin left the Midwest for California. "Swimaster, a rubber company in Los Angeles, bought a company called Spearfisherman from Bud Brown, from Huntington Beach. They wound up picking me up to run the company.

Swimaster, for a small company, had a big impact on the fledgling diving industry. They introduced Duck Feet fins to the sport market, where they became the premier fin for many years. They also introduced the first flexable snorkle and the first American Speargun, based on what Jack Prodonovitch was making. "Bill Hardy, one of my customers, brought me down to San Diego where I met Jack and Wally Potts, saw their guns, and was just wide-eyed. With the two of them we produced the Swimaster guns, wich later became the Voit guns, wich are now the JBL guns"

Also from the line was the wide-view mask with a big purge valve and neoprene seal. There were no large staffs in those days, it was just Dick and the production manager running the show.

Dick got to know alot of the pioneer shop owners, including Bill and Bob Meistrell of Dive n' Surf and Mel Fisher of Mel's Aqua Shop.

The forerunner of DEMA started out at about this time. Dick was one of five men who started an assosiation in diving. The diving industry was small but, growing in 1957. Called the Organization of Underwater Manufacturers, it met regularly for years and evolved into todays DEMA.

Swimaster was sold to Voit, and Dick moved to Sportsways. There he worked with Sam LeCoq. He was the first to apply the oring sealing principal to diving equipment. His Sportsways Waterlung was the first successful single hose regulator. He also produced the first submersible gauge, the Sea view and the first breathing valves engineered for diving. Dick at this time was Vice President in charge of products and sales. The company also had some serious problems, many of them financial, so Dick left Sportsways and a few years later they went belly up.

Bonin and Gustav Dalle Valle (friends and business partners) were on their own now and risked their meager savings on their new company, Scubapro.

Based in a rented shed in Gardena, Dicks income went from \$13,000 a year to zero. "We went through hell. We didn't take saleries, couldn't pay bills, bounced checks

and even had ou rphone line shut off at one time." After struggling and trying to keep their heads above water, They developed their own products and started to have some success.

Scubapro's first home grown product was the Mark II regulator. Another of their products was brought from France. Dalla Valle bought the rights to these fins with vents. Bonin told him that they were so ugly that they couldn't give them away. They soon realized that the new jet-fins were a hit.

Today, Dick Bonin continues to be an active diver but, rarley uses a tank. "freediving is the one activity takes my mind away from everything. When I go spearfishing I'm completly absorbed. When I met Prodonovich and made his guns, some of the top spearfishermen started to come around, including Terry Lentz and Jim Christensen.

Big Jim was the one who introduced me to the breakwaters, which I never knew were worthwhile. It's always a thrill to remember your first Yellowtail, which I got undera paddy. My first White Seabass was a long time coming, after 3 or 4 years I though I was never going to get one. That was a tremendous thrill.

Bonin retired from Scubapro in 1991, but not from diving. When DEMA experienced organizational difficulties, Dick was asked to guide them through the crises. He then went to head up Ocean Futures, a non-profit organization formed to represent the diving community on issuesof access and the enviroment. "Several years ago when California brought up the gill net controversy, I found out diving is not organized and that the enviromental area is a minefield."

The gillnet issue in California could have been lost if the state's dive shops had not supported a major petition to get the proposition on the ballot. As a result, gillnets were banned. "The diving community needs a voice before someone else speaks for us."

"Ocean Futures is dedicated to preservingwhat we have and leave a heritage for the divers to come. ..not just protecting the reefs but, development of reefs and educational programs . If it all works, I see an international organization, because the problems are worldwide. The marine enviromental movement in the U.S. is ahead of the other areas. Many have joined from other countries because they have the same problems. The potential is immense."

Hats off to our fellow Long Beach Neptune, Dick Bonin.

Cal. and asked for someone to let him borrow or rent weights so he didn't have to pay for shipping his own. He also asked for some areas to go or even tag along with someone. I PM'd him and after a couple PM's we had a plan to hit Catalina. I was able to get Hollywood Hughes and Paul Zylstra to commit to the trip, we were set. A couple days before the trip Hughes has to back out because of work. I start working the phones, after 6 calls the only one that wasn't working was Keith, but he was already commit-

ted to another boat. I wished him luck and told him to stay off my SPOTZ.

Friday morning arrives, I pick up Manuel in Newport at 0500 and run to the boat. We find Paul waiting in the lot. We load up and after a nickel tour of the boat and a brief safety talk we leave the slip.

YT, great guys to spend a day with!






## Deep Tease By Todd Norell

SC, MM and I were on a scuba trip aboard the Peace Boat going for bugs at Santa Rosa Island in mid Feb. I went down to about 70 ft. with an unloaded mini gun hoping to shoot ling cod in the rocks while I

was searching for bugs. Something shaded me from the side and I looked away from the reef to see a massive and dense wall of 20+ pound yellowtail. I think I thought it was an illusion at first, as they approached to within just a few feet of me. Unreal. I quickly pulled the 3 bands on the little JBL 38 Special and swam right into the school with bubbles



flying profusely. Didn't seem to phase them. I let er rip and pegged a nice one, perfect - right above the lat line - could not have been more thrilled . . . that is until the shorty shock cord went tight. Then



Bingo, the fish ripped off! I'm Pissed with heart racing, the glory was so fleeting! I'd already envisioned my proud and triumphant ascent of the boat ladder, nice forkie in hand. Now I'm really blowing off the discharge, knees just off the sand. I grabbed the spearshaft, checked the worthless tip, fumbled and shoved it into the muzzle, wrapped the cord, loaded just two bands. Still right in the middle of them - thick as thieves! Now in agro mode, I lunged up hurriedly and released a second shot - but Missed!!##!!. That was it, they'd had enough of me. ## Ultimate Steamed Clams (Submitted by Todd Norell)

#### Ingredients:

4 dozen live clams
2 sweet Italian sausages – skinned & chopped
4 stalks of celery – chopped
½ of a sweet yellow onion – thinly sliced
5 cloves of garlic – chopped
5 sprigs of tarragon – strip the leaves & chop em
2 tablespoons of fennel – chopped
Handful of parsley - chopped
½ cup of Muscat (sweet desert wine)
1 cup of dry chardonnay
Virgin olive oil ( for the initial sauté)
½ cup heavy cream






Add oil to large high sided skillet or frying pan and sauté the onions until they are translucent. Toss in the celery, fennel, & garlic - keep cooking. Introduce the sausage pcs and cook until no longer red. Add the muscat and chardonnay (don't be afraid to taste test before adding). Simmer for 2 or 3 minutes, stirring. Add the tarragon. Simmer for a few more minutes. Add the clams and cover. Cook under cover for about 8 minutes or so, and make sure all the clams have opened. Discard any clams still closed. Should smell awesome now. Transfer to a high side pot if your pan is too full. Add heavy cream and stir. Cover and cook on low simmer for a few minutes. Shut off the heat and prepare crusty garlic bread. Open the lid and throw in the parsley. Dish up and enjoy!


