

# Catalina Campout 2019 Scott By Petra Farquar and Scott Bamsey











# Wyatt learning some new lessons on the "Maniac"

Hobie, Wyatt, and I set out on the "Maniac" is search of yellows in my back yard. I told Wyatt to bring some paper and a pencil so he can write down a few things he'd learn along the way. Thankfully he brought his 7 mil as the water temp had dropped a few degrees- but that didn't stop Hobie from rocking his "vented" suit. We got on the spot a little early and after some back and forth about water temps and recent GWS sightings I was first in the water. Like clockwork on this spot the fish showed up. They made their appearance 15' below the surface and I took a slow drop down and leveled off next to them. Waiting for a larger model to present itself I took a lazy shot at a nice fish and ended hitting it high. It bolted into deeper water and eventually sawed off since I strung the fish and was using cable. A short while later I get schooled again in a similar manner; however, this time I make sure to use proper form and not rush my shot. It was hard to not string these fish since vis was around 20' but I make quick work of it and our first fish was on board. After the action died we bounced around to a few spots. We exchanged jokes and jabs and had laughs at each other's' expense. During our lunch break it went wide open on the 'cuda and we found out just how much (or little) fish like to bite Hobie' jig. After reviewing a few key hunting points with Wyatt I jumped in on a boiler rock with my 90 looking for calicoes. I was 10' from the rock about to make a drop when I had yellow swim right under me. I dropped down and center punched the fish. The small diameter shaft didn't do much but irritate the fish as it wouldn't die. After dispatching, I swapped out guns and swam off the edge into deeper water. Shortly thereafter I had another fish show minimal interest at depth and took a shot as it retreated into poor vis and ended up missing. After several more uneventful drops we called it and headed for the barn. With a few fish, laughs, and some lessons learned we called it a day.

The next day as you know we were up by 5am getting ready to the tuna grounds. We were at the grounds in short time and there must have been 100lbs flying kites and balloons.


The good thing was all the boats were spread out. We started metering fish At first light and meter marks where the key for this trip because we did not see one foamer the entire trip. I was the first one on the step and the first good marks we saw I dove deep and saw a school but missed. It is always amazing to see fish the first time of the season. We were rigged for anything and we had super cow rig ready as the fish could range from 30-300lbrs.

I was able to connect on my fish the second drop of the morning (before 8am). The fish put up a valiant fight but I was able to get a second shot into it about 20 min later and landed my first 100# tuna.

As the day went on everyone on the boat had opportunities with Todd landing his fish around 5pm. Todd's fish was around 90#s. Todd's fish had major heart and his took a little longer to land then mine.

I was lucky and ended up Shooting a second fish the next day which was a lot smaller then the first but ended up with my first tuna limit ever.

We ended the trip was 3 bft and seahunt was also out on the water and landed several fish with John carpenter shooting his first blue fin! It was great to work together with our Neptune brothers and share these special memories.



# RECIPE OF THE MONTH GROUPER OR SNAPPER VERA CRUZ BY: HOBIE LADD

Chop a yellow or white onion. Slice a bunch of grape tomatoes. Chop a bunch of green olives, no pimentos. Chop jalapenos and chop garlic cloves. Rub olive oil on casserole dish. Mix all of it together and sauté it for a while then cover dish with the mix, use either snapper or grouper, place fish on top then put cayenne pepper on top of fish and cover with the rest of mixed veggies. Bake at 425 for 30 minutes! You can use more or less jalapenos or none at all (if you are a wuss like Mike Marsh) then bon appetit!
