
EDITOR'S NOTE



Through the experience of spearfishing, I treat it like golf, you may not get your low score every time you play as shoot the big fish every time you spear but you played the best you could with what you have available that day. Through the tentative process I've met amazing Neptunes and shared some great laughs and good times. Excited to keep this adventure going.









The other weekend a few friends and I made it out to SCI looking for yellows. The tuna pushed out to Tanner and we simply didn't have the time to get there. We started on the east end where Bilhorn and crew were working a spot and gave us a quick update of the island. I readied myself for our first drift but could tell conditions were sub optimal. I put my head underwater looking for the high spot but the hazy vis was working against us. I found the bait and made my first drop to 40'. I had a single yellow come through below me out of range but was encouraged at the prospect. This proved to be a tease as we worked the cove moving westward.

We found better vis and current but only one quick sighting of skittish fish. We moved around a few more times eventually settling on the last spot of the day. I dropped into some blacksmith and from below came a school of the right kind. Not immediately interested, I coaxed them within range and sent it. I saw that my shot was good and put the brakes on. The fish made it to the boat shortly thereafter and I was back in the water looking for his friends. With the sun setting and the skunk off the boat we set our course for the barn. On one of the stops I pulled out my pipe gun and went in the shallows to see what was around and came up with a little checkerboard. As life keeps getting busier, it's good to bring home fish when it counts.


